Dear Representatives:

The undersigned organizations, including many members of the <u>Green Affordable Housing Coalition</u>,¹ write to request your support for the Green Resources for Energy Efficient Neighborhoods (GREEN) Act. The GREEN Act would make modifications to federal housing and lending policy to provide incentives and financial tools for property owners and the building sector to improve energy efficiency.

The benefits of improving energy efficiency and sustainability in affordable housing include utility cost savings, health improvements, more robust transportation options, and better connections to services and economic opportunities. Furthermore, energy efficiency improvements in subsidized housing can yield significant cost savings for the federal government. As of 2010, HUD's estimated annual utility bill exceeded \$6 billion. With Congress continuing to adopt fiscal austerity measures, this is an unsustainable cost that will crowd out spending on other community development priorities. We believe that the GREEN Act will facilitate substantial energy and water cost savings for new and existing affordable housing by providing incentives for increased energy efficiency and environmental sustainability.

The principles and practices of energy efficiency and green development offer proven, cost effective ways to address current and longstanding housing challenges, such as rising energy and transportation costs and environmental quality, all of which disproportionately affect low-income people. There is experience and research showing that with the right resources and approaches, adopting green building and rehabilitation practices significantly reduces utility costs. These costs savings can be used to improve underwriting criteria for affordable housing developers, and can provide financial benefits to the federal government, property owners and residents. This holds true for all types of housing developments nationwide, in both small and large communities.

Again, we strongly urge you to co-sponsor and/or support the GREEN Act and look forward to the reintroduction of the legislation in the 112th Congress. This legislative initiative is being led by the Honorable Congressman Ed Perlmutter (CO-7).
